FIND YOUR WAY TO SOUTHWEST WYOMING

HOW TO GET HERE



NEARBY AIRPORTS

Start your escapades at Southwest Wyoming Regional Airport, just 10 miles east of Rock Springs, or road-trip from Salt Lake City International Airport (approx. 200 miles) or Denver International Airport (approx. 350 miles).



DRIVING

Rock Springs and Green River are conveniently located off I-80 and situated along scenic highways 191 and 530.



CAR RENTALS

If you fly into town, there are several rental agencies available, including Enterprise and Avis.



TRAVEL TIPS

Be Elevation Ready: Rock Springs and Green River sit more than 6,000 feet above sea level. Prepare yourself for the higher elevation and prevent sickness by drinking plenty of water, resting and taking anti-inflammatories to help with head and body aches should they occur.

Limited Cell Coverage: Parts of southwest Wyoming have little to no cell service. If you're planning to get out and meander through off-grid areas, let someone know where you're going and when you plan to return.




TRAVEL TIPS

Drive Safely: Rock Springs and Green River are home to many backcountry roads. When driving, use a high-clearance, four-wheeldrive vehicle if available and stay informed on weather and road closures by visiting wyoroad.info.

Gas Up Before You Go: The wideopen spaces in southwest Wyoming are a road warrior's dream with several towns located 100 miles apart. Be sure to fill up your tank before hitting the road.

GREEN RIVER RECREATION CENTER

Whether you prefer to pump the iron, make a splash or engage in friendly sports competition with your crew, Green River Recreation Center has all you need for an active day of fun.

Discover indoor spaces for playing at Rock Springs Family Recreation Center, featuring a public ice rink, an indoor running track, a mini water park and group classes like yoga and dance.

Set in southwest Wyoming along the Utah border, Sweetwater County is a high-desert oasis, rich in natural beauty, culture and history. Here, more than just Western charm awaits. You'll discover tales of bank-robbing outlaws and hope-filled pioneers, wide-open spaces that provide thrilling adventures and thriving downtowns brimming with good food and welcoming locals. Explore our lands and see all that southwest Wyoming has to offer.

ROCK SPRINGS

Named after a former spring that flowed through town, Rock Springs sprung from the growth and development of the area's coal-mining industry. The booming railroad and mining work left behind a culturally diverse community, considered to be home to 56 nationalities.

The railroad's conversion to diesel and oil power in the mid-1900s drove out many of the city's coal mines. Today, Rock Springs thrives with trona mines, oil, gas and other industry sectors, keeping the city vibrant with locals and visitors alike.

Although the mining industries have changed over the years, Rock Springs is still known as a local hub for history, dining, shopping and attractions. Check out its award-winning downtown, which boasts more than a dozen locally owned bars and restaurants, a vibrant arts and theater scene, and the Rock Springs Historical Museum.

GRFFN RIVFR

Who needs an amusement park when nature has all the best rides? And, in Green River, you don't have to worry about the lines. World-class fishing along with tubing and kayaking at a whitewater park are just a few of the many ways to enjoy the great outdoors, not to mention the views. The town is also known for its incredible mountain-biking opportunities, including the Wilkins Peak Trail System - named one of the top singletrack trails in Wyoming. See more on page 24.

When you're not on the go, you can enjoy the comforts of Green River's downtown. Browse local boutiques for one-of-a-kind items, unwind with a refreshing brew as you take in the surrounding buttes and plateaus or stroll along the Greenbelt Pathway that meanders through town.



FARSON & EDEN VALLEY

Now home to thriving farming and ranching communities, Farson and the Eden Valley once served as a main thoroughfare for passing travelers and settlers. Then, in 1907, John M. Farson's largescale irrigation development attracted long-term residents with the promise of fertile lands and lush fruit orchards.

Nowadays, the area offers visitors an abundance of outdoor activities, from hiking and biking the Mormon and Oregon trails to camping, stargazing and boating at Big Sandy Reservoir. Plus, no trip to Farson and Eden Valley is complete without a stop at Farson Mercantile for a famous Big Cone ice cream.

SUPERIOR

Fueled by the booming times of the Union Pacific Coal Mines, this town was once home to nine working mines and led the West in coal production. While the town's mining days are gone, you'll still feel that Western spirit when you visit. Learn about local coal-mining and town history at the Superior Museum, hike scenic Continental Divide trails or see one of the navigation arrows formerly used by early 1900s airmail pilots.







GRANGER

Once a center for fur trappers, Granger became an integral crossroads for many pioneers seeking westward passage. A popular stop along the way was the Granger Stage Station State Historic Site. Originally built in the 1850s for the Overland Trail, the station also attracted travelers from other famous routes, including the Pony Express and the Oregon, California and Mormon trails. Today, you can step inside the old building, explore trail monuments and learn about the history of fur trapping, trading and the stagecoach industry.

WAMSUTTER

Originally inhabited by the Shoshone and Ute tribes, Wamsutter was founded in 1868 to service the Transcontinental Railroad. Nowadays, it's a base for sheep ranching and naturalresource development - not to mention a prime destination for spotting local wildlife. Admire southwest Wyoming's sagebrush desert and observe its unique critters - including North America's only herd of desert elk - and hike along miles of nature trails with a camera and binoculars so you don't miss any animal sightings.

SWEETWATER EVENTS COMPLEX & SPEEDWAY

Set against the beauty of the White Mountain, Sweetwater Events Complex offers year-round fun for all ages. With 320 acres of space, this facility is one of the largest in Wyoming and hosts a variety of events. Wild West fans can watch talented cowpokes at thrilling rodeos, like the Red Desert Roundup Rodeo. Celebrate summer with family and friends during Wyoming's Big Show featuring carnival rides, concerts and more. Or enjoy a fall weekend of fast-paced excitement as horses and jockeys thunder across the track during the Sweetwater Downs race series.

For those who crave the sweet roar of engines, you won't want to miss out on the stock car and motocross races happening at the Sweetwater County Speedway, located at the Sweetwater Events Complex. Discover more events at sweetwaterevents.com or sweetwaterspeedway.com.

TOP SOUTDOOR ADVENTURES

One of the best ways to experience southwest Wyoming is to explore its plethora of natural wonders. Create unforgettable memories with family and friends as you venture out on these top outdoor escapades.

FLAMING GORGE NATIONAL RECREATION AREA

Flaming Gorge National Recreation Area is a year-round fun zone for nature fans. In warmer months, ramble along more than 200 miles of hiking trails; cast a line for bass, catfish, trout and kokanee; or get out on the water for kayaking, water skiing and boating. In winter, landscapes blanketed in snow create the perfect setting for ice-fishing derbies, Nordic skiing and snowshoeing. See more on page 19.





KILLPECKER SAND DUNES

Play in nature's sandbox at the Killpecker Sand Dunes, one of the world's largest active sand-dune fields. Tackle the mammoth 100-foot hills in dune buggies, dirt bikes and ATVs across 11,000 acres of designated Open Play Area. Non-motorists can surf the sandy waves on sandboards and sleds or hike across the dunes for a glimpse of southwest Wyoming's wild horses and rare desert-elk herd. See more on page 22.

THE GREEN RIVER

When you're looking to beat the heat, there's no better place close to town than the Green River — namesake of the charming city on its banks. Float or paddle in the flowing waters of the Green River Whitewater Park and Tubing Channel. Or, check out the river's Expedition Island, known as a Blue Ribbon trout-fishing spot and an ideal launch site for downriver excursions.





WHITE MOUNTAIN PETROGLYPHS

Set along the sandstone walls of White Mountain, these petroglyphs offer a glimpse into the area's past. Hike along a short trail to find the remarkable 300-foot cliff-face canvas. Roughly 200 to 1,000 years ago, the Plains and Great Basin Native Americans carved hundreds of fascinating petroglyphs into the rock.

Visiting this impressive site gives you the opportunity to view the stories told by those who lived them. See more on page 23.

MOUNTAIN BIKE TRAILS

Take a two-wheeled journey through southwest Wyoming, where you'll find singletrack trails for all skill levels. Plus, you can test out some of the nation's most sought-after trails, which include the Wilkins Peak Trail System named one of the most popular biking trail systems in Wyoming. Choose from 14 routes, traversing more than 30 miles of diverse terrain to see what all the fuss is about. See more on page 24.

STEP BACK INTO WYOMING'S PAST



MUSEUMS

From pioneers searching for a better life to passing outlaws like Butch Cassidy, southwest Wyoming has seen its fair share of interesting characters. Discover their stories along with tales of dinosaurs, the Union Pacific railroad, coal mines and Indigenous peoples at these museums.

SWEETWATER COUNTY HISTORICAL MUSEUM

Set in a former 1931 post office, this Green River museum is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and offers a variety of both permanent and temporary exhibits. Peek into the past with a collection of antique photos and artifacts that highlight the mining ghost towns of Dines, Winton, Gunn and others.

ROCK SPRINGS HISTORICAL MUSEUM


From famous bandits to westward-drawn travelers — Rock Springs has seen it all. Learn about this town's proud heritage at the Rock Springs Historical Museum. Housed in the former Rock Springs City Hall, the museum paints a picture of the coalmining industry and the colorful people it attracted. Visitors can also enjoy a self-guided audio walking tour of the historical area.

WESTERN WYOMING COMMUNITY COLLEGE NATURAL HISTORY MUSEUM

This archeologists' and geologists' playground boasts locally discovered fossils of massive fish and reptiles, as well as prehistoric pottery and other relics from the area's earliest inhabitants. Walk among giant, life-sized dinosaur replicas, like Stegosaurus and Tyrannosaurus rex, peppered around campus. Remember your visit with dino-themed souvenirs from the college bookstore.

SUPERIOR MUSEUM

This museum offers visitors a window into local coalmining and town history. Explore remnants of the past, including newspapers from the 1940s, mining equipment, vintage sports jerseys and a bright-green bread-slicing machine.



HISTORIC TRAILS

See southwest Wyoming's network of historic trails, where hopeful pioneers braved unsettled lands on their way toward a better life in the West. Just like the wooden wheels that carved the land, it's easy to carve out a journey of your own. No other place in the United States has more miles of still-visible pioneer trails.

OREGON TRAIL

Easily one of the most famous pioneer trails in the United States, the Oregon Trail was a major thoroughfare that guided about 400,000 people across the expansive West from 1846 to 1869. The 2,200-mile route helped expand the California Gold Rush, and the stretch found here is one of the most intact today.

PONY EXPRESS

During the height of its service, the Pony Express route passed through the region and had a relay station near the Lombard Ferry. Mail carriers could ride a horse at full gallop, then switch mounts at the following station, effectively cutting maildelivery times by 10 days.


CHEROKEE TRAIL

Also known as the Trappers Trail, the Cherokee Trail was primarily used by cattlemen driving herds north and south, as well as droves of hopefuls seeking their fortunes in gold. The area's economic growth and the settlement of the West owes much to this historic trail that ran from Oklahoma through Kansas and Colorado into Wyoming.

OVERLAND TRAIL

Famously traveled by the Overland Stage Company in the mid-1800s, the Overland Trail was used frequently as a mail route to Salt Lake City. It created an alternate route to Oregon and California, paving the way for significant development in those areas. Today, the Overland Trail is one of the region's most accessible pioneer trails.

OUTLAWS, PIONEERS & DINOS, OH MY! Learn more about the area's historical sites, including a map of its storied pioneer trails and the best places to access them. Plus, get details on some of the museums' incredible artifacts.



MORMON TRAIL

Taking a leap of faith, thousands of Latter-day Saints made their way west in the mid-1800s to set up their religious headquarters in the heart of Salt Lake City. The Mormon Trail passed through a substantial portion of southwest Wyoming, following roughly the same path as the Oregon, California and Pony Express routes.


OUTLAW TRAIL

It's only natural for lawbreakers to want to avoid crossing paths with those who enforce it.
Outlaws such as Butch Cassidy, the Sundance Kid and Jesse James made a trail of their own through southern Wyoming.

OLD EMIGRANT TRAIL

During the mid-1800s, migrants from the eastern United States journeyed west seeking the prosperity of gold and freedom of religion. The Old Emigrant Trail is an overlap of the Oregon, California and Mormon trails. It still bears the marks of its past travelers, including ruts from wagon convoys.

DIDYOUKNOW

FACTS

Before he became the notorious, gun-slinging outlaw Butch Cassidy, Robert Leroy Parker briefly lived and worked around Rock Springs. There, he reportedly gained the nickname "Butch" while working at a local butcher shop.

Sharpshooting legend Calamity Jane also spent some time around Rock Springs, and rumor has it she had a dugout on what is now M Street.

In 1869 and 1871, American explorer Major John Wesley Powell used Green River's Expedition Island as the launch point for his journeys to map out the Green and Colorado rivers and document the Grand Canyon.

While Pilot Butte serves as an important habitat for wild horses, its position atop White Mountain makes it a valuable navigation landmark for passing pilots.


PLAY, SPLASH & CRUISE UNDER THE SUN IN THE S

Panoramas of red-rock formations and the vast, tranquil waters of the Flaming Gorge Reservoir are found just south of Rock Springs and Green River. Drawing outdoor enthusiasts, families and those just seeking a beautiful view, the Flaming Gorge National Recreation Area offers things to do and see year-round. Here, below the endless blue sky and away from the bustling crowds, you can rediscover what adventure is all about. Check out a few ways to experience one of the state's hidden gems.

FLAMING GORGE SCENIC BYWAY ROUTE

Take the scenic route and roam the Flaming Gorge Scenic Byway — one of only 37 designated All-American Roads in the nation. Starting and ending in Rock Springs, this journey follows highways 191 and 530 and circles the Flaming Gorge National Recreation Area that includes a 91-mile-long reservoir. It's the perfect way to see the beauty of the region in just a few hours. Along the way, catch glimpses of wildlife, capture family memories at picturesque pit stops and learn about the area's pioneerand outlaw-filled past.

Fun Fact: The byway passes over part of the historical Overland Trail and close to Browns Park Recreation Area. Originally known as Brown's Hole, it was a popular hideout for notorious bandits of the day like Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid.







FLAMING GORGE BUS TOUR

One of the best ways to traverse Flaming Gorge National Recreation Area is with a full-day, private bus tour. Leave the planning to the pros and let your sense of wonder take over. Your knowledgeable local guide will show you what southwest Wyoming is all about with breathtaking vistas and cool facts about the area's wildlife, geology and history.

During the tour, your crew will travel across dramatic landscapes on an airconditioned motor coach. The nine curated stops include Red Canyon, Flaming Gorge Dam, Sheep Creek

and Firehole Canyon for pictures of deep, blue waters and gravity-defying rock formations. This tour is fun for all ages, with trivia, a scavenger hunt for the kids (and the kids at heart) and more.

In addition to a delicious boxed lunch, you'll enjoy Food Network-famous Cowboy Donuts, ice cream, snacks and bottled water along the route. Just bring yourself, comfortable walking shoes and a camera to snap pics of the canyon scenery. Private, discounted tours are available for groups of 20 or more passengers, with tickets at \$49 per person.

ADVENTURE WITH A LOCAL GUIDE

Enjoy all the captivating views with none of the planning on a full-day bus tour of Flaming Gorge Country, complete with wildlife, fun facts and plenty of photo-worthy moments.



DRIVE AROUND THE FLAMING **GORGE RESERVOIR** YOURSELF

Enjoy the sights of the reservoir at your own pace with leisurely stops along the way. Take your time to watch herds of pronghorn antelope romp across the plateau and admire the red-streaked cliffsides. Or, extend your trip with an overnight stay at nearby campgrounds and sleep beneath the twinkling stars.

This drive is a partially off-grid experience with limited cell service. Be sure to pack extra water and snacks. If possible, travel in a high-clearance, four-wheel-drive vehicle and let someone know when you plan to return.

Flaming Gorge Country has nearly endless ways to explore with biking, hiking, camping, rafting, fishing, boating and more. For those who prefer to take it easy, just sit back and soak up the scenery along the Flaming Gorge Scenic Byway that encircles the 91-mile-long lake. This is the perfect way to see a variety of wildlife, mountain vistas, desert landscapes, unique rock



formations and more.



MARINAS

As Wyoming's largest reservoir, Flaming Gorge offers boaters their pick of paved boat ramps. It also features three full-service marinas spread across its western and southern shores. Take advantage of their facilities, which include equipment and boat rentals, campsites and cabins, tackle shops for anglers and on-site dining. Or use the marinas as your jumping-off point for land excursions like hiking and biking.

BUCKBOARD MARINA

Located on the reservoir's west side, Buckboard Marina is the closest to town — just 25 miles south of Green River. Onsite you'll find all the amenities you'd need for a day or week by the water, including in-house fishing guides, full-service RV sites, a tackle shop and general store with food, drinks and Wyoming-state recreation licenses. Take advantage of their year-round RV camping and angling opportunities.

LUCERNE VALLEY MARINA

On the southwestern side,

Lucerne Valley Marina is ideal for a day with family and friends on the water or a weekend fishing trip. Open April to mid-October, the marina offers boat slips for your own vessel or rentals for everything from paddleboards and pontoons to wakeboards and water skis. At day's end, enjoy food-truck fare at the Lakeside Grill, followed by a soft bed in a waterfront cabin.

CEDAR SPRINGS MARINA

Two miles from Flaming Gorge Dam, the Cedar Springs Marina is on the south side of the reservoir. It's open from mid-April to mid-October and offers a variety of camping and lodging facilities, tours of the lake, a full-service slip and the floating dockside Snag Bar & Grill.



YEAR-ROUND ACTIVITIES

Throughout history, this area has hosted mountain men, pioneers, outlaws and Native Americans. Today, it welcomes anyone with an insatiable appetite for outdoor escapades and those just looking to enjoy the stunning scenery. Here, the fun continues year-round, with water sports when the sun shines bright and snow excursions come winter.

SUMMER & FALL

Bring your stand-up paddleboards, kayaks and canoes for a paddle along the shore. Find honey holes in the reservoirs' tucked away corners to land trophy-sized bass, trout and catfish. Thrillseekers can rent motorboats for afternoons of water skiing. On land, you'll find mountainbiking and hiking trails for all ages and abilities. Bring a camera and binoculars on your outing to catch glimpses of local critters like eagles, bighorn sheep, mule deer and pronghorn antelope.

WINTER & SPRING

When the snowflakes begin to fall, the reservoir transforms into an outdoor lover's winter wonderland. When a thick layer of ice covers the water, anglers flock to the frozen surface to catch trout and burbot and compete in icefishing derbies. Meanwhile, landlubbers relish the miles of snow-blanketed trails for cross-country skiing and snowshoeing. The world will feel like your private snow globe as you glide or trek across the plains and hills.





DISCOVERNATI


As part of Wyoming's largest county, Rock Springs and Green River have a bounty of natural beauty to explore, from plateaus peppered with sagebrush and gravity-defying rock formations to riverside oases brimming with a variety of wildlife. Venture out and experience these local treasures for yourself.



PILOT BUTTE WILD HORSES

Run wild and let your mane fly in one of the few remaining places where the spirit of the West still thrives. Visit Pilot Butte, where wild horses roam free and untamed. With a population of about 1,500, you may hear the thundering of hooves before you see these magnificent creatures.

Drive the Pilot Butte Wild Horse Scenic Loop for the best chance to witness the majesty of these wild horses among some of the most scenic overlooks in southwest Wyoming.



SEEDSKADEE NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE

The Seedskadee National Wildlife Refuge is a nature enthusiast's dream. With more than 26,000 acres of wetlands and open plains, there's plenty of space to roam.

Tour the refuge by foot, boat, horse or car and keep an eye out for historical ranching sites and pioneer-trail crossings, like the Lombard Ferry. Seedskadee also boasts virtually endless opportunities to engage with native species, from fishing its world-class trout waters and hunting big game to spotting wildlife like moose, peregrine falcons, trumpeter swans and bobcats.



Disclaimer: Access to some of these areas may require a four-wheel-drive, high-clearance vehicle and good navigational skills, as some roads may be unnamed. Be sure to bring water, have a full tank of gas and let someone know where you are going.

JRAL WONDERS



ROCK FORMATIONS

CASTLE ROCK

Towering above downtown Green River, Castle Rock is one of the area's most formidable geological landmarks. Over the years, it's been called the Citadel, Indian Head Rock and Green River Butte.

THE PALISADES

Deeply ingrained in U.S. history, the Palisades have served many purposes. Native Americans used them as protection from the elements, while trappers and traders saw the rock formation as an important marker to guide their journeys through the area.

TOLLGATE ROCK

Standing at 6,440 feet above sea level, Tollgate Rock is likely the tallest "toll station" in history. As the tales go, early Mormons created a road through a natural gate on the rock's south side. They then charged travelers a toll for passage through the gate, hence its name.

PILOT BUTTE

Dominating the surrounding landscape at 7,949 feet tall, Pilot Butte has been used as a navigational landmark since people first came to the region, and it's still used as an orientation point today. Head to the summit for panoramic views.

KISSING ROCKS

Suspended mere inches from actually "kissing" each other, Native Americans believed that the spirits of two doomed lovers from opposing tribes inhabited the rocks, only to spend eternity just out of each other's reach.

BOAR'S TUSK


Boar's Tusk holds great religious importance to the Native Americans of the region. The core of an ancient volcano, it rises out of the ground like a 400-foot-tall guardian to the Killpecker Sand Dunes.

ENJOY MORE OF THE GREAT OUTDOORS

Create an unforgettable trip with help from our planning resources, like a wild-horse-viewing guide or tips for year-round adventures in Seedskadee National Wildlife Refuge.







EXPLORE SINGING SANDS AT KILLPECKER SAND DUNES

Killpecker Sand Dunes is a vast, shifting expanse of soft, golden sand set against a volcanic butte and Wyoming's expansive skies. Formed over millennia from lava flows and sculpted by wind, the dunes rise up to 100 feet, creating a roller coaster of hills for sandboarders, ATV riders and hikers.

Among the dunes, you'll also find striking rock formations like the 400-foot Boar's Tusk spire and the flat-topped North and South Table mountains. Venture to higher vantage points to catch a glimpse of the rare desert elk, found nowhere else in North America, or bring binoculars and a camera to take photos of the free-roaming wild horses.

ATV RIDES

Motorsport fans flock to the dunes to rev up their dune buggies, dirt bikes and ATVs and tear across 11,000 acres of open land. Beginners stick to the flatter areas and smaller knolls to learn the ropes, while advanced riders show off their skills on the mammoth hills.

SANDBOARDING

If you're less interested in kicking up sand with motors and tires, simply surf down the dunes on a sandboard or sled. For the best experience, ride early in the morning or later in the evening when the slopes are cooler. Be sure to bring along some wax to keep your board gliding smoothly over the grains.

EQUIPMENT RENTALS

Gear up with ATV and sandboard rentals from nearby Rockin' Rollin' Rentals & Sales. If you're hooked, sandboards are available for purchase at the Explore Rock Springs & Green River Visitor Center in Rock Springs.



LACE UP FOR HIKING ADVENTURES

Fill up your water bottle, lace up your hiking boots and get ready to uncover verdant riversides, rugged cliffs and sunbaked desert along this region's diverse and stunning trails.

WHITE MOUNTAIN **PETROGLYPHS**

At White Mountain, etched sandstone cliffs reveal centuries-old carvings. The Plains and Great Basin Native Americans created intricate designs on these 300foot walls, depicting scenes from their lives up to a thousand years ago. A short hike to the Upper Wasatch formation reveals this rare, open-air gallery — a quiet space to reflect on the stories left by Wyoming's earliest-known inhabitants.

GREENBELT PATHWAY TRAILS

The Greenbelt Pathway in Green River is a series of paved, family-friendly trails totaling more than 12 miles. Soak in some sunshine along the river, passing through parks and quiet neighborhoods by foot or bike.

FLAMING GORGE COUNTRY TRAILS

Just south of Rock Springs and Green River, Flaming Gorge Reservoir and its surrounding plateaus offer ample opportunities to hike and investigate the arid terrain. Wander through sagebrushpeppered desert and soaring rock mesas.

KILLPECKER SAND DUNES

No path is needed when you have acres upon acres of soft sand to meander. Hiking the Killpecker Sand Dunes — one of the world's largest active sand-dune fields — can range from easy to hard, with some mounds reaching over 100 feet tall.

SEEDSKADEE NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE'S FLICKER TRAIL

Beginning at the Seedskadee National Wildlife Refuge headquarters, the 2-mile Flicker Trail loops along the Green River through wetlands and cottonwood forests, leading you to prime moosespotting and birding areas.

PEDAL EPIC MOUNTAIN BIKING TRAILS

Whether you're a novice mountain biker or a true gearhead, it's no secret that this area is home to some of the nation's most soughtafter singletrack. Here, rugged paths meander through sagebrush plains and sandstone ridges in scenic open spaces — it's the ultimate playground for two-wheeled fun.

WILKINS PEAK TRAIL SYSTEM

The state's most popular trail system, Wilkins Peak features 14 routes over 20 miles of desert terrain. Packed with tight switchbacks, big bridges and steep drops, these trails keep even the most experienced riders coming back for the thrills.

CHANNEL SURFING TRAIL

Skill Level: **Beginner** Distance: **1.66 Miles**

Channel Surfing traces the rushing Green River with views of the city and towering bluffs. With sandy paths and minimal elevation, it's perfect for relaxed, easygoing rides along the banks.

BRENT AND MIKE'S TRAIL

Skill Level: **Intermediate** Distance: **6 Miles**

A favorite among intermediate riders, this route twists through swooping berms, ladders and drop offs, with alternate lines for those looking to dial down the intensity.


PICK YOUR POISON TRAIL

Skill Level: Expert Distance: 5 Miles

Starting from Brent and Mike's, this advanced trail tests seasoned bikers with quick zigzags, challenging climbs and rocky, technical obstacles.

MUSTANG LOOP

Just west of Western Wyoming Community College, Mustang Loop is a 3-mile, multiuse trail that's ideal for beginners. The gentle path weaves through spacious, high-desert landscapes inviting riders — and even hikers and winter cross-country skiers — to explore.





TEE OFF AMID HIGH-DESERT BEAUTY

Perfect your swing at golf courses surrounded by lush greenery and desert vistas. Whether you're looking to try out a new sport, bond on a work trip or simply enjoy an afternoon outside with friends and family, these courses offer top fairways.

WHITE MOUNTAIN GOLF COURSE

Start your day at the fully stocked pro shop to pick up your clubs, then warm up on the driving range. When you're ready to tee off, choose from 27 championship holes, designed to challenge golfers of all types, and set against the striking, chalky slopes of White Mountain. A roaming food and beverage cart keeps you refreshed on the greens, while Eve's, the on-site restaurant, awaits with a juicy rib eye or topping-stacked pizza post-round. Non-golfers have plenty to enjoy here, too, with a fishing and boating lake, a peaceful duck pond and a ball field complex.

ROLLING GREEN COUNTRY CLUB

Nestled along the burbling Green River, Rolling Green Country Club welcomes member and nonmember players from near and far. The course's mature, 71-par layout weaves through tall evergreens and long stretches of open grass where you just may see a moose or leggy deer wandering the grounds. Save your appetite for a cool beer and some fairway fare at the nearby clubhouse after the final putt.



EXPLORE DOWNTOWN CHARM IN ROCK SPRINGS & GREEN RIVER



ROCK SPRINGS: WHERE CULTURE & HISTORY AWAIT

Rock Springs, a Great American Main Street award winner, is steeped in Wyoming's mining and railroad history. It grew with the late-1800s coal boom, powering Union Pacific's steam engines and shaping the region. This culturally rich community still thrives with its eclectic mix of art galleries, historical landmarks and wideranging restaurants.

COMMUNITY FINE ARTS CENTER

The Community Fine Arts Center houses a permanent collection of more than 500 original American works, from colorful portraits to expressive sculptures. Visit during your trip to catch community events, like a live painting demonstration or a weekday art class.

HISTORIC ROCK SPRINGS COAL WELCOME ARCH

First illuminated in 1929, the Historic Rock Springs Coal Welcome Arch is an iconic symbol of the town, standing proudly above South Main Street. Walk under its towering frame and imagine the bustling days when steam trains brought workers and travelers from afar.

BUNNING PARK

Meander over to Bunning Park, the city's first park, a laid-back green space with tall trees, lush grass and a central gazebo. It's a favorite locale for live music, foodtruck rallies and local events like Sweetwater Blues N' Brews.



SUPPORT LOCAL BUSINESSES

These towns thrive on small and family-owned businesses, from boutiques and spas to bars and restaurants. Shop and dine locally to support these community establishments.





EOUIPMENT RENTAL

GREEN RIVER: EMBRACE RIVERFRONT FUN

From world-class fishing and wildlife watching to tubing and swimming, Green River has everything to enjoy the great outdoors. Wander scenic trails, settle a rivalry at family sports complexes or admire the nearby rock formations.

THE BREWERY

This building's castle-like design immediately catches your eye with its regal stone towers and decorative chalice. Stop by to sip cool draft beers and dine on juicy burgers.

CLOCK TOWER

Green River's clock tower stands tall in the center of downtown, surrounded by pine trees and soft grass. In the summer, it becomes a lively gathering place, where locals and visitors wind down and jam out to live concerts.

GREEN RIVER RAILYARD

In 1868, the Union Pacific railroad arrived in Green River and transformed the town. During World War II, more than 100 trains chugged through daily. Today, the railyard remains a fascinating place to learn about the town's industrial heritage.

EXPEDITION ISLAND PARK

In 1869 and 1871, Expedition Island served as the launch site for explorer and geologist Major John Wesley Powell's voyages to document the Grand Canyon and map the Green and Colorado rivers. Visit to enjoy family picnics, Blue Ribbon trout fishing and special events, including Flaming Gorge Days.

TOMAHAWK BUILDING

Opened in 1920 as a luxurious three-story hotel, this building once housed a bowling alley, tavern and even a JCPenney. Today, it hosts a brewery, restaurant and gift shop, specializing in Wyoming products, where visitors can take in the landmark's rich history.

Southwest Wyoming's sprawling landscapes and majestic wildlife have served as inspiration for artists from all over the world. See how you can embrace your inner creator in Rock Springs and Green River.

PERFORMING ARTS AT BROADWAY THEATER

Built in 1948, the Broadway Theater is nestled in downtown Rock Springs and hosts more than 50 performances a year, from musicals and comedy shows to dramatic plays.



MURALS AROUND TOWN

Larger-than-life murals abound in downtown Rock Springs. Seek them out and prepare to be amazed by these lively creations.

- Big Country: Rock Springs' first mural depicts iconic landmarks like Killpecker Sand Dunes and Boar's Tusk.
- Disarming: Rose Klein's brilliant piece celebrates southwest Wyoming's Chinese immigrant community.
- Rock Springs: A warm welcome to the city, this mural was completed by more than 20 youth volunteers and features important aspects of the community.
- Freedom: Birds soar and horses leap in this vivid, swirling scene by Chad Bolsinger.
- Pronghorn: Coyotes, snakes, rabbits and birds painted by Wyoming-based Dan Toro pay homage to Western wildlife.
- Lioness: A celebration of women's suffrage, "Lioness" showcases civil-rights leaders like Anna Julia Cooper and Ida B. Wells.
- Kickin' It in Downtown Rock Springs: Large cowboy boots tell the region's story through the lens of five local artists.
- A Tribute to Wyoming: The small mural illustrates notable Wyoming flora and fauna, like the American bison.
- Selfie Spots: Snap a selfie with Wyoming's state butterfly or the "Welcome to Rock Springs, WY" buffalo.



BRONZE SCULPTURES & PUBLIC ART

Around nearly every corner you'll find towering bronze sculptures throughout Rock Springs. Take a self-guided tour to visit some of the area's most notable public-art displays.

- Antelope: A herd of antelope is displayed at exit 102 on I-80, greeting roadtrippers as they make their way to Rock Springs.
- High Desert Elk: Appropriately situated on Elk Street, the desert beast appears to be gazing at the sun.
- Saluting the Flag: Eight small children stand with their hands over their hearts at the intersection of Gateway Boulevard and Dewar Drive.
- Mustang: Located on the Western Wyoming Community College campus, this bucking bronze horse captures the spirit of the region's wild herd.
- Pride, Strength, Perseverance: The Spirit of Western: See two mustangs thunder across the plains at Western Wyoming Community College.
- Busts of Historical Figures: Meet Archibald Blair, Rock Springs' first citizen, and Grenville Dodge, chief engineer of the Union Pacific railroad.

LOCAL ART GALLERIES

Located in the pedestrian underpass near the yellow Union Pacific caboose, Art Underground Gallery in Rock Springs houses a robust collection of murals of various mediums and themes by the area's accomplished and up-and-coming artists.

A cultural oasis, the Community Fine Arts Center features work by legendary American painters like Norman Rockwell, Elliott Orr and Raphael Soyer as well as pieces from local and regional artists. The gallery also hosts touring exhibitions and performing-arts programs.

Opened in downtown Rock Springs in 2021, Kneeland Fine Art highlights Wyoming's natural beauty through original paintings, photography and more.


